To achieve this vision the Foundation's dedicated team works with its funders and corporate partners to provide support for a wide range of activities, equipment, and therapies. The role of the Board of Directors of the Children's Rehabilitation Foundation is that it is to provide oversight, governance, and stewardship to ensure that the Foundation is positioned to continue to pursue its vision for years to come.

The Board of Directors takes their role seriously not only because it is their legal duty to do so but more importantly because they believe wholeheartedly in the vision of the Foundation. In the execution of their responsibilities, the Board meets regularly to review the progress of the Foundation and perform its fiduciary responsibilities. It is an important and necessary function required to maintain the trust developed over the years between the Children's Rehabilitation Foundation and the funders and corporate partners that make their vision a possibility year after year.

It is during these meetings that Board members become in tune with the

As much as analyzing the financial statements or reviewing department reports can enlighten the Board to the performance of the Foundation, the Thank You Binder is impactful.

It is the letters, notes, pictures, and emails in the Thank You Binder that brings home to the members of the Board of Directors the true picture of the performance of the Children's Rehabilitation Foundation. It is in the heartfelt messages detailing how a specially designed bike has brought

a smile and for the first time physical independence to a young child or teen. It is in the joy that is described in letters from the parents of children that for the first time in their lives are able to communicate with each other because of the Foundation provided iPad with speech-generating software. It is in the courage that can be felt in the letters from parents, children, and teens thanking the Foundation for the specialized wheelchairs, athletic prosthetic legs or myoelectric prosthetic arms that now allow them to perform to the uppermost level of their abilities. It is the page after page of these types of impact statements that prove to the Board that the vision of the Foundation is being attained.

This impact though could not happen without the support of our funders and corporate partners. You are literally the foundation to the Children's Rehabilitation Foundation. Your continued support is crucial if we are to be able to continue to create impact moments in the lives of children. Bernard's Story

As Bernard steadies himself to take the first few steps on his new prosthetic running leg, he grips the parallel bars as Rehabilitation Centre for Children (RCC) clinicians guide him through the motions.

Within minutes, Bernard progresses into the hallway - needing a little more running space to perfect his lay-up and jump shot footwork.

"My dream is to be one of the youngest players in the Paralympics," he beams.



Bernard was born with a proximal femoral focal deficiency (PFFD). The condition affects how the hip joint and leg develop, and as a result, he underwent a hip disarticulation. Only a small portion of people who have this rare amputation walk independently.

But Bernard is determined to show others that disability is not a barrier. The 12-year-old spends the majority of his free time running from basketball and wheelchair basketball, to sledge hockey and hip hop dance classes.

The Children's Rehabilitation Foundation (CRF) helped fund part of a prosthetic device with hydraulic control system that allows him to

walk and run and multiple speeds. This past year he also received a high-performance sled, so he can continue to progress as a hockey player.

"The sled has made me faster, shoot higher and my agility is super good," Bernard says. "My favourite part is racing up the ice while puck handling and scoring goals for my team."

As the 2018 Youth Ambassador for CRF, Bernard will spend the year representing the children and youth who benefit from the equipment, programs and services provided by CRF and RCC.

"To me, being the ambassador means having responsibility and committing myself to being a role model for younger kids," he says. "I want people to know that if you have a disability, or know someone who has a disability, do not doubt them. If they put their minds to it, they can do anything!"

One evening a simple chat about the children my Department has as clients resonated with my friend Rene Pereux. He listened not only with his ears but with his heart. At the end of our conversation he simply stated, "We have to do something for those kids!" Shortly after Sunkids Golf Tournament later to be renamed Starkids was born.

Rene and his committee have never wavered from the goal of making the tournament one that Children's Rehabilitation Foundation could be proud of. Many favours were pulled in by Rene and the committee to kick start this event from a simple idea. He has led the committee each year for 20 years with the goal of increasing the revenue to purchase whatever the Specialized **Communication Resources Children** Department needs.

Families, schools, therapists and most importantly kids have benefited from our growing library of 700 books and materials. Books and handmade materials have been used to help children reach their language goals, succeed in school and community activities but most importantly the

monies have given these children a voice. The books and training of therapists have moved children along the developmental path to either use one of the Voice Generating Devices the tournament paid for or to actually begin speaking.

The library allows the kids to go on adventures. learn about the world around them and bond with their parents. Often it leads to a child's first words, and tears of happiness in a parent's eyes.

Research

The overarching goals of research, evaluation, and quality improvement at both the Rehabilitation Centre for Children and SSCY Centre are to; learn more about issues that are important to children, youth, and families; improve care received through our centres; increase community participation; and improve quality of life for children, youth, and families. In my role, I work on many different types of projects, working toward these goals. My position is funded by generous donations to the Children's Rehabilitation Foundation.

The overarching goals of research, evaluation, and quality improvement at both the Rehabilitation Centre for Children and SSCY Centre are to; learn more about issues that are important to children, youth, and families; improve care received through our centres; increase community participation; and improve quality of life for children, youth, and families. In my role, I work on many different types of projects, working toward these goals. My position is funded by generous donations to the Children's Rehabilitation Foundation. I work with our clinicians to support clinician-led research and program evaluations. These projects focus on an identified need in a program, and help our clinicians learn new things and improve the quality of programs and services we offer. They also ensure we are using best clinical evidence to guide our programs and services, and that we are using our resources in the best way possible. Each project is unique, and I support clinicians in any way they need, such as with designing and developing the project, applying for funding and sharing results with families and other clinicians. Projects in the past year include:

- Developing and testing a new prosthetic wrist unit
- Evaluating satisfaction with the Stepping Out on Saturdays Chickadee Camp
- Applying for and receiving funding to develop a new 24-Hour Positioning Program in Assistive Technology;
- Presenting new technology to create custom seating at an international conference; and determining the number and demographics of children and youth with Cerebral Palsy who receive services from our centre.

Another large part of my role is coordinating the SSCY Research & Evaluation Committee. We review applications to conduct research at SSCY Centre, from clinicians, University researchers, and multi-site studies across Canada. We are also working on building partnerships with other organizations in Manitoba, increasing awareness of SSCY Centre as a place to do research, and increasing the number of different researchers conducting projects here. Encouraging diverse research at SSCY Centre helps promote SSCY Centre as a centre for excellence, and contributes to SSCY Centre providing evidence-based services.

These are just some of the projects happening over the past year. Every research project I work on is different, because they are designed to address a specific need for a particular program. However, all of our clinician-led projects have the same goals of improving our programs and services, ensuring we are using best clinical evidence, and providing the best care possible for our children, youth and families.


